For generations to come, the Josephine Riss Fang Endowed Scholarship will continue to inspire and support Simmons University students who share her passion for library and information science. Her scholarship is specifically intended for "students seeking to earn a doctorate or master's degree with a focus on international librarianship or preservation and conservation."









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The Josephine Riss Fang Endowed Scholarship

During her distinguished two-decade career at Simmons (1968-1989), Dr. Fang taught and pursued research at the School of Library and Information Science, where she was the first woman promoted to full professor. The many courses she taught included cataloguing, preservation, and international librarianship, among others. Professor Fang also advanced her field through active participation in many professional organizations including the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions, and the Women's National Book Association, which she served as president of the Boston chapter.







Created through a broad-based community effort, the fund includes more than 80 donors who were connected to Dr. Josephine Riss Fang in a variety of ways.
