

Ricki: Hey, everyone, great party today. Wow, this is a lot of people. It's a lot to take in, 100 years, and I'm not even 30 yet, I still have ways to go before I reach that mile mark of so many life-time experiences, and I'm still having a quarter life crisis. Well,

Oma, Happy Birthday! It's amazing! So I guess I'll start off saying 3 wonderful things I know about you. When I think about Oma, or as you know her as Josephine, she's got decades of experience, meanwhile I'm still learning and growing, living through a crazy world right now, but that doesn't sound too different from what Oma went through at her age or my age.

Honestly, that doesn't make much of a difference where we are currently, 100 and 26, because like I've only known her as Oma for the longest time. I'm sure she would be - I would have loved to meet everyone here at the same age, but it doesn't matter because she and I have a lot in common. In fact, she was there for me all my life.

We used to do exercises together even as Oma like taught me that. I made an effort to see her during that time, helped her keep moving even as things changed but to my surprise she was still active, she was strong in her own way, not even surprised actually. I was doubtful, I didn't push her. She was able to take care of herself. And even when she was tired I still didn't push her, she was still able to keep moving and when I saw that I realized to myself she's strong. She's strong in her own way, no matter the conditions, she's a trouper, and she still tried to be active no matter what the day, time and age. So whenever I think of Oma I think of that diligence, that determination to keep going.

But then I think of another thing when I think of Oma. What follows her closely is her ability to connect with others. I'm sure you all see right now that she has made a lot of good friends and family over the years that maybe if this backyard were bigger, we could have maybe three times as many people but that's not the day today and obviously it's too hot anyway. But actually we have a lot of interests. We both love the arts, we both love animals, and we both have a very sharp sense of humor. But when I'm speaking to her, I'm not just speaking to her. I'm speaking to someone who knows me. Like when we discuss about our interests for example, it's how I express myself to her, how I can open myself to her, and she understands that, she understands it without understanding what I'm trying to say to her. She sees the weight of my interests. the internal emotion, what it means to me, and she recognizes why it is important to me. She sympathizes. And when I talk to her, I hear wisdom, I hear openness, and inspiration. She shares to me her experiences without even telling me why they are important. It just feels like, it feels right, it feels a connection.

When I hear her, she is able to help me figure out for myself what I want to do, not telling me what I should do, and in a way that is comfortable. And every time I come back to see her and speak with her more, I'm energized each time, I just keep

wanting to go back, not just to hear her again, but to maintain that connection, and even when I'm not with her, it's always there, it still stays with me, that passion, that motivation, that enthusiasm, that encouragement, and it's the same kind of encouragement she imparts with other people, with not only her connections, but her ability to strengthen that connection. She has a love, an empathy, an aura, that she passes on to others without even telling them to do that and she's passed that love to us, not only her family, her kids, her grandkids, every one she interacts with she encourages them to open up. And I know that everyone makes a special effort to reach out to her, but she's also the one to initiate that effort to reach out to them in the first place. She evokes that kind of enthusiasm to care about others, the same thing that my Mom and Dad tried and try again. They are both retired now but they are still trying to look out for each other. And it's such a charitable attitude we couldn't live without that we can be thankful for.

Not just that, not only Oma's determination though, not only her compassion, those are strengths of hers, but that is not it. Those are not the only two parts of her when I think of Oma.

But perhaps the third and most crucial part that makes up her as a whole, that I don't know what would happen, but honestly, better not think what would happen, because these past few years, I know you are all aware of all the crazy hiccups, raging epidemic, having people come and go, and we've seen bad stuff happen, a lot of things we can't explain, we can't describe why they happen, and sometimes we feel like blaming ourselves or blaming someone else, because we are so scared and confused and lost, but Oma, every time, she hasn't given in to that, she has remembered to look on the bright side, that no matter how scary things get, she never stops looking up, she never stops looking forward, she always remembers the things that are most important in life, that even when it is hard to believe, never once try to doubt yourself, not try to doubt other things, not even try to say something else and make yourself feel worse about it, but instead take the moment to look at the things that are special in life that you already have, things you have gotten, and yes that things you have lost, but that is what makes it all the more special to remember and right now there are still so many things we can be thankful for. Like we can be thankful for meeting Oma, for knowing Oma, but we can also be thankful for meeting the people Oma knew and making new friendships and new connections because of her. And remember that, no matter how crazy it gets, be thankful for that. Always look on the bright side. Always don't forget to remember that hope. And that there are people out there who love you, who care about you.



So let's all take a moment to look back, to be thankful for all of those things. Be thankful the person who made it, who if she hadn't have been around these past 100 years, wouldn't be the same day as it is now. Same beautiful day, same day we can all be together, celebrating. For making it possible for, even with this big family that you have on your own, to make it possible for the family abroad, for us in Austria, for connecting, even with each other because I saw my cousin Susanne, my other cousin, we see each other more often coming here than we see each other in Vienna. This is exactly what makes it so special coming here, not just for our interest in the U.S. which comes from you. When I talk with colleages at work they envy me for having family here because views of the U.S. outside the U.S. vary. I can only repeat what Ricki said: you taught us all to open and not to get out of this envy and live and have something good and have somebody envy you, but share the wealth and the wisdom and generosity you always taught us to, not taught us but just gave it to us with natural, to share it with friends and family. On my own I was able to bring friends to Thanksgiving Day, that's not normal. So it was always great coming here. I always tell to friends, it's like going to - I'm living in Vienna now, it's the capital of Austria and my Mom lives outside in the town sort of like Belmont is to Boston coming here to Belmont is like going to visit my Mother in Moedling. I just come here - it's a little bit longer ride - I just hang around, it's just family, I feel welcome and it's not just me it's both family and friends just come here, and the greatest things about your family, and that's what you made possible. So thank you for that openness and generosity and for making it possible for all of us. Thank you very much, Tante Sefi.
